The nursery crew reported a serious problem late this fall with a serious die off of fish. We were losing 5-6 fish a

day at one point and called the fisheries experts from the fish commission. Their biologist took samples of fish, water, and food and when all was analyzed the issue was traced to a mold in a bag of fish food. Once the problem was found, the nursery crew was able to get control of the situation. In total, we lost about 50 trout.

The 2013-14 Trout in the Classroom year has begun. The Brook Trout eggs were delivered sometime between November 5th and 7th. A couple of our teachers are getting to be old hands at this trout raising business. Rick Stevens at the Delahunty Middle School is now in his fourth year and Luke Rust from Mercer school district in his third year knows the routine. Jan Abernethy from East Middle School in Greenville, and Karl Rupert from the Farrell School District are both in their second year.

Everyone has reported to have received their eggs with viable egg numbers somewhere between 250 and 300. Losing fish during the course of the program is inevitable, but all the schools should have fish to release this spring

TIC T-shirts are now available for purchase. As a joint initiative by the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission and the Pennsylvania Council of Trout Unlimited, all proceeds from this fundraiser will be used to directly benefit the Trout in the Classroom (TIC) program, such as providing additional equipment to classrooms, funds for release days and field trips, educational materials, and more. Try "Different" Fishing

Just what is meant by "different" fishing? If you are like me and don't like crowds, then try fishing at less popular times, or seasons. It could mean fishing different places from the same old "I always catch them at the place where the stream goes around the bend by the farm house" or something like that. Different can be fishing with a different approach. Last year I vowed to give jig fishing a serious try for crappie. The results were surprising; at least a 5 to 1 catch rate on prespawn crappie with jigs vs. minnows. Don't be afraid to fly fish for crappie. When the spawn is on, a white streamer is absolutely deadly.

Different fishing can be something like night fishing for large trout (make sure it's legal in the stream you choose). If you plan to night fish, forget skinny tippets and smallish flies. Go with 2X and wet flies on #6 or even #2 hooks. Know the area you plan to fish so you can avoid tripping or snagging in the trees. The big fish always show after dark. The biggest trout I ever hooked was at night and he broke off 15 lb line that wrapped on my reel handle. I won't forget that night.

Maybe different is to take a child fishing for a day. I know it will be special for the child and it's something you will remember fondly. Make it fun and ice cream is a good way to end the trip.

The idea is to try something fresh and new, not the same exact approach every season. I fished Coolspring many years ago on a hot July morning. By buddy and I were fishing by 7:00am with beetles and ants. In one stretch of 100 yds I caught and released 9 nice browns. One was over 16 inches. By 9:30 it was done, but what a great morning. No one else was there to disturb the fish before us.

Think about how you will do some "different" fishing this year. I know you will be pleasantly surprised with the outcome. Send a pic to us to post on the website if you get a nice one. Good luck.

Be the Voice for Trout in Pennsylvania Jim Kearney

The Pennsylvania General Assembly has returned to Harrisburg for the 2014 legislative session, and still, we need to remind them to protect fish and wildlife by opposing House Bill 1576 and Senate Bill 1047. Legislators have been hearing the sportsmen's voice on these bills - thank you for your efforts to date. As the new legislative session begins, we must continue to let them know just how important this issue to us - and to our natural resources. The vote in the House can come at any time and the Senate will begin hearings on the bill this month

Now is the time to contact your legislator and let them know that it's crucial that Pennsylvania relies on science - not politics - to determine the future of its fish, wildlife and natural resources. Urge your Representative and Senator to protect coldwater resources and fishing opportunities by opposing these bills.

Call and write your Representative and Senator and tell him or her that...

- ① HB1576 & SB1047 will slow down-or halt-progress made to identify and designate Class A Wild Trout Waters, leaving Class A Wild Trout streams without deserved protection while Pennsylvania Fish & Boat Commission (PFBC) staffing and funding resources are diverted to fulfill additional bureaucratic duties associated with the state's regulatory review process. As the recent Pennsylvania Supreme Court decision in the Act 13 litigation held, the Commonwealth has an affirmative constitutional duty to protect Pennsylvania's natural resources-including fish and wildlife-under Article I, Section 27 of the Commonwealth's Constitution (known as the Environmental Rights Amendment).
- Both the PFBC and the Pennsylvania Game Commission (PGC) currently

processes for designating
threatened and endangered species,
and wild trout streams (in the case
of PFBC), that considers public
input. Data are obtained via well
established, scientific sampling
methods. Neither the Independent
Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC)

nor the legislature have the scientific expertise to determine whether scientific methods employed to determine whether a species should be listed as threatened or endangered or whether a stream can

have rigorous and transparent

be listed as wild trout water is sufficient to warrant protection.

These bills will eliminate the independence of the PFBC and the PGC, by subjecting their actions to list wild trout waters and threatened and endangered species to the IRRC review process-a process that adds extra layers of bureaucracy, creates administrative inefficiencies, and will require a formal rule-making process for each listing-delaying protections for at-risk fish and wildlife. By doing so, the legislature could be risking federal funding and increasing the role of the federal government in conservation of Pennsylvania's fish and wildlife.

Save Those Cans but DON'T CRUSH!!

If you recycle aluminum cans and live in the Mercer area and want to help out TU, listen up. FIRST, do not crush the cans as there is a label on them that will return money for cans from certain states. Not sure how we reclaim that but please don't crush.
